### Art In The Service of Music (and Food!)



This summer, Greenwood artist-in-residence Anthony Hawley (husband of senior camp faculty member Rebecca Fischer and father of unofficial Greenwood mascots Oriana and Ilaria (pictured at left for no reason other than their almost inhuman adorableness) mounted a major art installation in our performance barn, with each piece offered for separate sale, and fully 50% of the proceeds from each sale going to the Greenwood Forever! capital campaign. While many of the pieces have sold, plenty remain available, and you can [view and purchase them online at Anthony's website](#).

Each piece measures 6" x 6", drawn in oil marker over a gesso-primed wood base. The pieces range from [doggedly geometric](#) to [sparsely abstract](#), and are priced at \$100 apiece. Again, that's \$50 towards Greenwood's new kitchen/dining building and capital

campaign with every click of the PayPal button. And we've been meaning to mention that your living room could really use some sprucing up, you know, with some art or something. We're just saying.

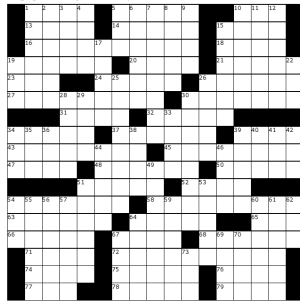
